Located at the easternmost point of the main level of Laurelton Hall, the living room was linked to the reception hall by a passageway.

This approximately 1,600-square-foot space was referred to as the forest room. Its walls and ceilings enveloped the visitor. A painted pattern of gray-green interlacing chestnut leaves enhanced the effects of natural light and the colored light of the lamps. The result was reportedly akin to the richly varied light of an actual forest clearing.

The room's centerpiece was a massive wood table over which green turtleback-glass globes and shades were suspended from a wrought-iron yoke. The surface of

> the desk was covered with plants and flowers, stacks of magazines, and personal items. In the background, a grand mantel displayed Tiffany glass and pottery.

> At one end of the room, steps led to an alcove where Tiffany eventually placed several of his prized leaded-glass creations, including sections disassembled from the Four Seasons, a large window from Tiffany's awardwinning exhibit at the 1900 Exposition Universelle in Paris. Other parts of the window were installed in the reception hall at the garden entrance to the house. On adjacent walls were two exhibition windows, one of a figure with gourds and another featuring a maiden feeding flamingoes. The largest of the living room windows, *The Bathers*, ran the width of the alcove and was destroyed in the fire that devasted Laurelton Hall in 1957.

These important windows, with their depictions of nature, enhanced the unity of the room both architecturally and thematically. Resonating with Tiffany's spirit, the forest room epitomized Tiffany's personal aesthetic and lifelong pursuit of beauty.
