
Before the advent of emails, text messages, and other forms of digital correspondence, the letter was the primary form of written communication distinguished not only though words but also in a unique personal writing style. Bringing together a diverse group of objects from the Morse's collection, *Arts and Letters* explores the art of writing and the ways in which Americans of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries used the written work for both communication and creative expression.

Wish You Were Here

In the nineteenth century, letter writing was an essential social practice. For Charles Hosmer Morse (1833–1921) and his family, who spent time in Chicago, New York, and Winter Park, written communication provided a way to keep in touch and share important information. Though separated by great distance, three generations of the Morse family stayed up to date on family developments and even celebrated significant milestones through letters and postcards. The examples shown here, written by Charles, his daughter Elizabeth Morse Genius (1872–1928),

and granddaughter Jeannette Genius McKean (1909–89) née Jeannette Morse Genius, provide a glimpse into their lives and illustrate the importance of written correspondence during the period.

The Golden Age of Postcards

The popularity of letter writing in the late nineteenth century produced a number of lucrative business opportunities including postcard production. Postcards, patented in 1861, guickly became a popular and easy way to send images and share travels through the mail. By the turn of the century, the postcard craze had created a global distribution network connecting photographers and printers across the world. The desire for postcards declined after World War I as the use of the telephone became more common, but they remain important documentation of both visual and written communication.


